Despite being at the heart of philosophical debate from Ancient Greece to the Nineteenth Century however tragedy has yet to receive proper treatment as a philosophical tradition in its own right. From Heidegger's reading of Sophocles Antigone to Nietzsche and Benjamin's book-length studies of tragedy Philosophy and Tragedy presents an outstanding and original study of this preoccupation. The five sections are organised clearly around five major philosophers: Hegel, Holderlin, Nietzsche, Heidegger and Benjamin.
