Therefore, evaluation strategies for adult learners must accommodate their desire for practical, relevant, and self-motivated learning experiences. According to Knowles' principles, adult learners benefit from being evaluated on real-life applications of knowledge rather than abstract theories or rote memorization.

Several studies have pointed to the limitations of traditional testing methods in adult education. For instance, standard multiple-choice exams or standardized testing often fail to capture the practical skills that adult learners may have developed through professional experiences. A review of assessment strategies by Brookfield emphasized the importance of flexibility and adaptability in evaluating adults, suggesting that formative assessments, which provide ongoing feedback, are more effective than summative evaluations that occur at the end of a course.
