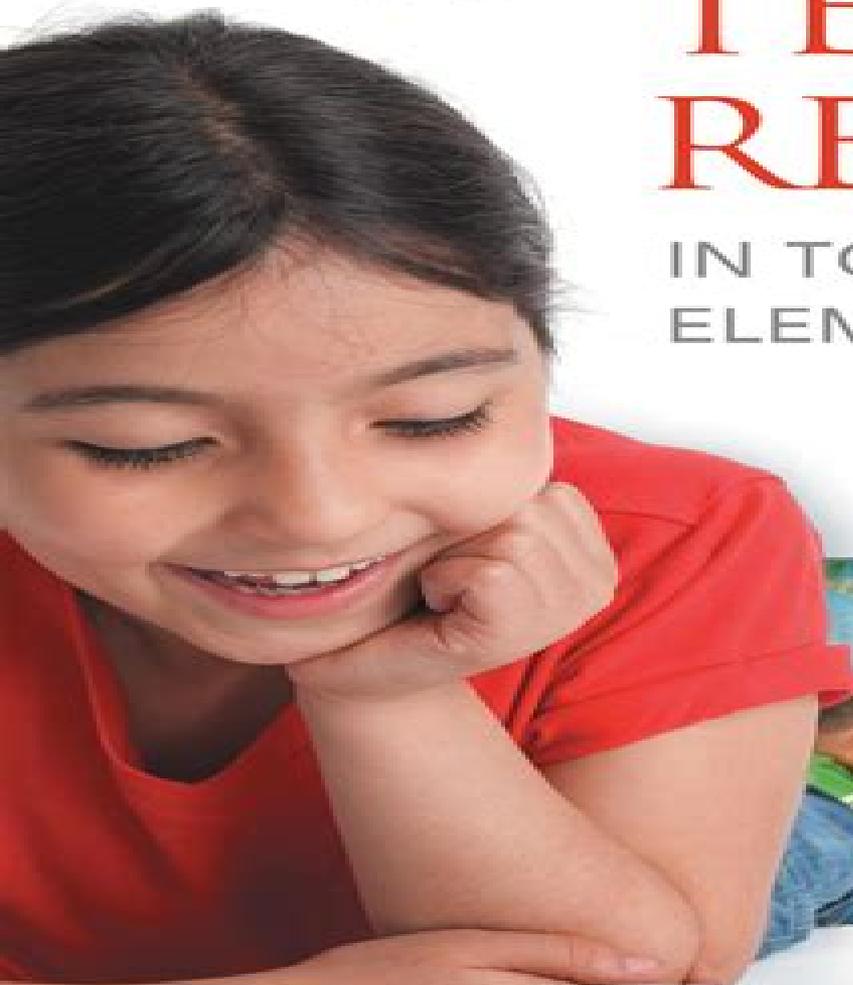

A Study of Predicting Academic Success in Elementary School Reading from Projective Tests Robert Bain Bailey, 1956 *Fostering Success in Reading* Richard Austin Evans Jr., 2006 This study examined reading programs in 68 Texas elementary schools that were identified as successful by their scores on TAAS assessment results in the 1999 2000 school year These schools student populations had a high proportion of culturally diverse and low SES students The purposes of this study were 1 to determine if and how teaching methods and collaboration intervention support teams were used by effective schools to foster reading success in all students 2 to identify cohesive

patterns clusters or models in schools use of collaboration and teaching methods 3 to examine these clusters of similar schools and see if the patterns differed based on the school community demography urban suburban or rural The study was conducted in 68 schools in 33 school districts that represented various demographic settings from 12 different Education Service Centers across Texas From these original 332 variables 26 variables were selected that were of medium frequency and strongly correlated with highTAAS scores over a 4 year period These 26 variables were used to examine the 68 high performing Texas elementary schools for clusters K means analysis and HCA were both applied to the 26 response variables using them as complementary techniques to arrive at a five cluster solution Results from correlations of individual characteristics and from identifying school clusters suggested that school community type could possibly be moderately predictive of student performance on the TAAS TAKS overtime

Reed,2005 Research in the area of reading clearly demonstrates the effectiveness of explicit and systematic instruction when teaching students reading to learn skills such as vocabulary and text comprehension The purpose of this investigation was to assess the effects of the Reading Success Level A program on the comprehension skills of 93 fourth graders across four general education classrooms Two general education teachers participated in this study over a 6 month period Pre and posttest data were collected on individual student performance using the Scholastic Reading Inventory SRI In addition within program assessments including mastery tests and quizzes were administered as part of the program Results showed that students who participated in Reading Success Level A demonstrated statistically significant gains in reading comprehension performance from pre to posttest In addition at risk readers made similar gains to those readers who were not at risk indicating that Reading Success Level A was effective across students Results are discussed in terms of the implications for effective reading comprehension instruction and areas of future research Document *Educational Publication* North Carolina.
